Frequently Asked Questions

Prospective students often ask how long the **Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice** takes to complete, what the program costs and if financial aid is available, and if the degree is awarded through USC Upstate.

You can find answers to these questions below.

- Completion time varies based on accumulated credits in general education and other courses required for the major. The degree requires 120 credit hours. It is up to the student and advisor to decide the appropriate number of hours to take each semester.
- Students are eligible to receive applicable federal and state financial aid assistance. Current fees and tuition rates can be viewed at www.palmettocollege. sc.edu.
- The degree is awarded by the University of South Carolina Upstate and meets the same rigorous standards and accreditation as any traditional degree from UofSC.

Prerequisites and Requirements

To apply for this online degree program, students must have:

- Minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in all previous college-level course work
- Students transferring credits into the program are encouraged to have completed the following courses:
 - Two courses in Composition
 - College Math (or higher) and Statistics
 - Public Speaking or Interpersonal Communication
 - Natural Science with a Lab
 - Humanities
 - History
 - Two courses in world language, or placement in the intermediate level in world language

Curriculum

Our criminal justice program offers introductory courses in the three major areas of the criminal justice system - law enforcement, courts, and corrections - as well as a wide variety of upper division courses including advanced topics in criminological theory, violence, corrections, delinquency, victimology, and crime analysis, which uses data science and research methods to improve law enforcement.

The curriculum includes coursework in the following disciplines:

- Law and Judicial Systems 6 credit hours
- Policing and Corrections 6 credit hours
- Advanced Issues related to Crime 3 credit hours
- Criminological Theory and Research 6 credit hours
- Criminal Justice Specialization 15 credit hours
